

Captain VAN F. WESTFALL U. S. Navy

Captain WESTFALL was born in St. Louis, Missouri. After graduating from a local high school, he attended Drury College and Washington University in St. Louis. In 1956, he entered the Navy as an Aviation Officer Candidate and was commissioned in January 1957.

Captain WESTFALL reported to his first squadron, the Screaming Eagles of VF-51 in April 1957, where he gained valuable experience as one of two ground officers assigned. After a WESTPAC deployment aboard USS BON HOMME RICHARD he received orders to VA(AW)-35 as part of the initial cadre of Naval Aviation Observers (NAO) flying the AD5Q.

Captain WESTFALL returned to civilian life after his initial service obligation but returned to active duty in 1961 when he reported to VAH-123, NAS Whidbey Island. He became a Bombardier/Navigator and joined the Vikings of VAH-10 in August 1961. Leaving the venerable A-3D Skywarrior, Captain WESTFALL received orders to the Navy Plant Representative, St. Louis, engaged in production acceptance flying of all versions of the F-4 and RF-4 aircraft.

Attack Squadron 52 transitioned from the "Spad" to the A-6 Intruder in July 1967, and Captain WESTFALL joined them after completion of VAH-123, which was at that time training both A-3 and A-6 aircrews. June 1969, saw Captain WESTFALL back in production acceptance flying again, this time as the Navy Plant Representative, Bethpage, New York. Captain WESTFALL flight tested and accepted the last A-6A, all the A-6C's and the first production A-6E's and EA-6B's.

In August 1972, Captain WESTFALL returned to Whidbey and VA-128 for refresher training. After a brief stay, Captain WESTFALL joined the Lizards of VA-95 as Executive Officer and took command in April 1974. During his tour, VA-95 received the CNO Safety Award and was an active

participant in the evacuation of Saigon and the recovery of the SS MAYAGUEZ.

Captain WESTFALL served on the COMATVAQWINGPAC Staff as the Attack Readiness Officer. November 1976, Captain WESTFALL assumed command of the Golden Intruders of VA-128. His tour was highlighted by the continuance of VA-128's superb safety record, in excess of 43,000 accident free flight hours resulting in the CNO Safety Award (second consecutive award), being the recipient of the Senator Henry M. Jackson Award, and selection to Captain. Captain WESTFALL most recently completed a tour as Executive Officer of USS RANGER.

Captain WESTFALL assumed command of USS CONCORD (AFS-5) on 16 June 1980.

Captain DONALD V. BOECKER U. S. Navy

Captain Donald Vaux BOECKER enlisted in the Navy Reserve after graduating from high school in 1955. He grew up in Naperville, Illinois, where he was active in all sports, earned his Eagle Scout badge and learned to fly as an Air Scout. After boot camp training, he attended Columbian Prep School in Washington, D.C. Through the reserves, he earned an appointment to the U.S. Naval Academy in 1956. He played both varsity golf and football at the academy and was graduated in 1960. After being commissioned, he served as company officer for the new Plebe class during their summer training. He commenced flight training at Pensacola, Florida, and was designated a Naval Aviator in February 1962.

After completing training in the A-4C aircraft at Attack Squadron FORTY-THREE at NAS Oceana, Virginia Beach, Virginia, he was assigned to Attack Squadron SEVENTY-SIX where he deployed aboard the USS ENTERPRISE for her first two Mediterranean deployments and also participated in the Cuban Blockade. During this tour he served as Legal Officer and Personnel Officer.

Captain BOECKER transferred to Attack Squadron SEVENTY-FIVE in September 1963 and served as Personnel Officer in the first A-6 squadron. He deployed to Southeast Asia and on 14 July 1965, while on a combat mission, he was forced to eject over enemy territory where he successfully evaded the enemy and was rescued eighteen hours later. A second cruise aboard the USS INDEPENDENCE took him to the Mediterranean for the initial A-6A deployment with the Sixth Fleet.

In September 1966, Captain BOECKER reported to NAS Patuxent River, Maryland, where he attended the U.S. Naval Test Pilot School, graduating in June 1967. He was assigned to the attack branch of the Weapons System Test Division where he served as team leader for a joint Navy/Air Force preliminary evaluation of the A-7D/E aircraft, completed the joint service evaluation, and later became Project Officer in charge of the Board of Inspection Survey Trials for the A-7E at NAS Patuxent River, Maryland.

In October 1969, he reported to Attack Squadron FORTY-TWO, the A-6 readiness squadron, at NAS Oceana, where he served as an A-6 instructor pilot and as Training Officer. In November of 1970 he reported to Attack Squadron SEVENTY-FIVE and served as Maintenance Officer during a Mediterranean CV deployment aboard USS SARATOGA. He served as Operations Officer during this tour also.

In April 1972, he was assigned as Plans and Programs Officer on Commander Medium Attack Wing ONE Staff at NAS Oceana, Virginia Beach, Virginia. In May of 1973, Captain BOECKER reported as Executive Officer of Attack Squadron EIGHTY-FIVE aboard the USS FORRESTAL in the Mediterranean. On July 1, 1974, he assumed command of Attack Squadron EIGHTY-FIVE aboard USS FORRESTAL anchored off Palma, Spain, and remained in command during another Mediterranean deployment until November 1975.

Captain BOECKER then served for three years in Washington at the Naval Air Systems Command as A-6 "Class Desk Officer" where he was in charge of all technical improvements to the A-6E airplanes — most importantly, the Target Recognition Attack Multisensor (TRAM).

In May 1978, after completing perspective Executive Officer Training at Newport, Rhode Island, and Norfolk, Virginia, he reported as Executive Officer of USS SARATOGA in Mayport, Florida, where he served until November 1979 and made another deployment to the Mediterranean. In December 1979, he reported to the Office of the Under Secretary of Defense (Research and Engineering) where he was Staff Specialist in the Tactical Air Warfare Branch. He was responsible for monitoring the aircraft programs, preparing Defense System Acquisition Review Council pre-briefings, preparing answers to Congressional questions and keeping the Under Secretary of Defense informed on Navy and Air Force fighter aircraft, particularly the F-14, F-15, F-16, and F-18's.

In August 1981, he attended the Senior Officer Ship Material Readiness Course in Idaho Falls, Idaho.

Captain BOECKER has been awarded six Air Medals: two Navy Commendation Medals with combat "V", the Combat Action Ribbon, a Navy Unit Commendation, the Navy Expeditionary Medal, the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, and several Viet Nam decorations.

Captain BOECKER is married to the former Gay Lanier Scott of Winter Haven, Florida. They have six children: Michele, Stephanie, Danielle, Virginia, Dione, and Scott.

Rear Admiral Richard Kern FONTAINE was born in Minneapolis, Minnesota on 31 May 1928, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jean Henri Fontaine. Graduating from the academy in 1951, he was commissioned an Ensign and through subsequent promotions attained the rank of Rear Admiral in March 1978.

THE SHIP

USS CONCORD is a "Mars" Class Combat Stores ship. It supplies the fleet at sea or inport with about 28,000 different items of fresh, frozen and dry provisions including general and technical stores. Automations and computerization simplify the management

and operations of cargo inventory and ship's propulsion.

USS CONCORD has five cargo holds that contain the majority of her cargo. One of these holds is dedicated to refrigerated and frozen provisions. Some of the holds contain thousands of racks, bins, and drawers for spare parts stowage. Automatic data processing equipment aids in maintaining accurate real time, stock control, fiscal records and in locating items for issue. Internal cargo handling is greatly expedited by the use of installed cargo heavy duty elevators built in pallet and packager conveyors, and battery operated fork lift trucks. External cargo operations are simplified by the use of sophisticated electronically controlled winches for connected replenishment cargo transfer.

The ability of USS CONCORD to provide fleet units efficient supply support from a single ship in a short period of time enhances fleet mobility by increasing its endurance in a combat zone while reducing exposure to enemy attack during underway re-supply operations. Some of the basic characteristics of USS CONCORD
